Dear Members,

I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season. We have been busy, busy, busy at Sarasota Audubon! We have a few exciting announcements.

First, we are launching a new membership platform. All existing members will be sent an invitation from Memberplanet to register and renew their membership if it is due. Your memberships will now run a full calendar year from your signup

#### date.

With this new system, we can offer some really amazing new benefits including: 10% discount in the gift shop (exclusions may apply), opportunities for early signup for events, and membersonly events. These will be added to all of the existing benefits you have always enjoyed!

Second, we completed our annual Christmas Bird Count on Dec. 28th. We documented 168 species in all of Sarasota, with 116 species at the Celery Fields (same as 2023 for CF). Scroll to bottom of this newsletter for the full report! It was an amazing day birding with lovely weather. Some exciting rare birds were spotted at Celery Fields -- a White Crowned Sparrow, Baltimore Oriole, Ash-Throated Flycatcher, Ruby-Crowned Kinglet, and the Tropical Kingbird. Come and see if you can spot them too!

Last of all, we anticipate that the Smith Farm development on Raymond Road will go before the Board of County Commissioners this month. No date has been set. Please look out for future communications. We will need everyone to send emails, just like we did with the Planning Commission. More importantly, we will need people to show up at the public hearing and tell the Commissioners why this place is so important and why it concerns you that it might be developed.

Thank you all so much for your continued support in all of our activities. You all are responsible for the vibrant place the Sarasota Audubon Nature Center at Celery Fields is!



- Visit Pantanos de Villa, a Ramsar Wetland of International Importance that provides critical habitat for waterfowl and migratory shorebirds.
- Travel by boat to witness the seabirds of Ballestas Islands, including the Humboldt Penguin, Peruvian Booby, Inca Tern, and the near-threatened Peruvian Diving-Petrel.

## Myakka River State Park CBC

We tallied 120 species, only four less than last year's count. Forty-four participants covered almost 160 miles in 72 hours, on foot and by vehicle. Smaller flocks of Tree Swallows, American Robins and ducks resulted in the lowest number of those species in the last five years.

We added a new record: A Clay-colored Sparrow in the company of Savannah Sparrows in the east prairie.

A rarely seen male Northern Harrier hunted over the upper lake (Stu Wilson's team). Known as the "gray ghost", the male harrier has a gray back, white below and a gray owl-like face.

# Sarasota County CBC

The 74th Annual Sarasota Christmas Bird Count was held on Dec. 28, 2024, and involved 127 volunteer birders in 17 sectors. The 15-mile diameter count circle, covering 177 square miles, is centered at the intersection of Beneva and Bee Ridge roads. This year's count **tallied 168 different species featuring 32,538 individual birds.** 

Compared to last year, we had five fewer species and nearly 5,000 fewer individual birds, which may be attributed to our summer and fall storms, increased development or low counts for specific species.

Highlights included a likely first county Red Phalarope off Siesta Key Public Beach, an Eastern Whip-poor-will in The Meadows, a White-winged Scoter off of Pelican Cove, and a Clay-colored Sparrow out east in Saddle Creek.

Per usual, Celery Fields, led by Kathwren Young, tallied the most species (119, same as 2023) and featured many notable birds: a lingering Tropical Kingbird, an Ash-throated Flycatcher on Mt. Celery, a pair of very late or possibly overwintering Yellow Warblers, and at the Nature Center feeders, a female Shiny Cowbird and White-crowned Sparrow.

The 2025 count is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 27.


